• Older people and people with a physical disability - There is no drop-off area planned for the site which could impact negatively on this group:

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⁶ Direct discrimination occurs when a person is treated less favourably than another in a comparable situation because of their `protected characteristic' whether on grounds of age, disability, pregnancy and maternity, ethnicity; religion or belief; sex (gender), sexual orientation, or Marriage and Civil Partnership. Indirect discrimination occurs when an apparently neutral provision or practice would nevertheless disadvantage people on the grounds of their `protected characteristic' unless the practice can be objectively justified by a legitimate aim.

The policy is designed to allow the safe flow of pedestrians through the square and vehicular access has not been possible within the constraints of this site. A request for a drop-off point was submitted to Essex Highways by the Council but was refused for reasons of safety and the management of traffic flows.

 Younger people - The policy does not include on-site cycle racks. This could potentially impact younger people more than other groups as they are more likely to cycle.

It has not been possible to negotiate with the train operating company for the provision of cycle racks. Additional cycle racks will however be installed near the entrance to Britannia car park.

• People with a physical disability - The planned seating being with a back rest and arm support, whilst benefiting many groups including those requiring lumber support, may not be suitable for all some individuals within this group.

Reference has been made to guidance provided by The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association on their website

No design will meet all possible needs within this group, and it is felt that the preferred design will meet the majority of needs within the resources available.

• People with a sensory disability – Street furniture that follows the line of the station building could restrict access for this group:

The location of the street furniture is considered to be necessary as it clearly marks an unobstructed route from the public

pavement to the ticket office and platforms.
