WELSH WOOD LOCAL NATURE RESERVE

2.7 hectares Ancient woodland

- Forest School outdoor classroom (bookable)
- Main path is surfaced

Welsh Wood is managed in the traditional way by coppicing – cutting the trees down to ground level on rotation. It has a carpet of bluebells in the spring, along with Yellow Archangel and Wood Anemone. Standing dead trunks are left for woodpeckers and wood habitat piles for Stag Beetles. Its larvae feed off decaying wood and can take 3-5 years before forming the adult beetle.

SALARY BROOK LOCAL WILDLIFE SITE

19.5 hectares

Grassland & wetland

- Grass path network throughout
- Cycle track runs whole length of site
- Fishing permitted on two ponds (EA rod license required)
- One pond has disabled access

This river valley supports scrub and woodland, marsh and wet grassland. Its wealth of wildlife includes species not often encountered in an urban area, such as Dormouse, Water Vole and Otter, and over 100 plant species including the rare Sneezewort.
