



Military Families Project:

We awarded £250, (alongside further Locality Budget funding of £750), to the Chaplaincy team from 16 AA BCT, who wished to support their military families with resources from a national charity, designed to help build resilience in relationships. After an initial trial which received excellent feedback and positive outcomes, the Chaplaincy Team, decided to offer this to each 16 AA BCT home in the Garrison.

This funding was provided under a grant we received from the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust, along with further Locality Budget funding from Shrub End ward ClIrs, making a total of £1000, to support this project.

A soldier who took one home not only enjoyed the game and built resilience in their relationship, but his partner was so surprised that he had brought something 'so thoughtful' that enabled them to connect. We have seen Soldiers, Aviators and Sailors from across the ranks

Community Support

Winter Warmers Events, Colchester – Lakelands Centre & Greenstead

Winter Warmers is an event organised by NEST and community partners, and which involves a simple concept of collecting in donations of adults and children's winter clothing, coats, shoes, bedding and other items as appropriate, to the local scheme.

These items are then stored, sorted, and used to create 'pop-up' events that are open to any member of the local community, without the need to meet any criteria. They can just attend if they feel they need this kind of support, and will be welcomed and helped if needed, to browse and select items that they can take away without any judgement, to give them dignity in choice, and a better chance of eeping warm and well throughout the winter season.

Other help, advice and signposting was also offered as appropriate. Working together across all the events in both Colchester and Tendring, this helped support over 3000 people and families, ready for the upcoming winter months.

This involved collecting/sorting/hanging/bagging up and giving away, more than 24,000 items – including hundreds of warm winter coats, thousands of jumpers, rails and rails of warm pyjamas, lressing gowns, onesies, socks, slippers and blankets.

COMMUNITY DAYS OF ACTION

At Colchester City Council our Community Days of Action are collaborative efforts where Ward Councillors work with CCC Officers and members of the community to identify and tackle any issues they may have within their Ward.

Friday 3^{ed} November a Community Day of action took place in St Annes and St Johns ward. Coordinated by the three ward councillors and supported by the Community and partnerships team.

Around ten residents volunteered to support a coordinated litter pick, combing with targeted resources of the council's neighbourhood service team.







Health Inequalities

Addressing the Wider Determinants of Health

Colchester City Council has received significant funding from the North East Essex Health and Wellbeing Alliance and East Suffolk and North Essex Foundation Trust (ESNEFT) to address inequalities at place. The funding has given Colchester the opportunity to work with partners to address the wider circumstances and issues that affect a person's health outcomes.

Projects and work undertaken has included improving housing conditions and energy efficiency, improving access to physical activity opportunities, supporting residents with fuel poverty and the cost of living more broadly, improving facilities for children and young people, preventing homelessness and improving care support for older residents among many other initiatives.

Peabody Hospital Discharge Officer

Joint funding from Colchester and Tendring health inequalities funding was used to contribute towards a hospital discharge officer for a two year period. The officer provided advice and intervention for hospital patients who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, sometimes caused by a worsening health condition. They provided outreach support for patients, one off advice and guidance for patients to support with form filling as well as longer term support such as arranging suitable accommodation.

- One-off advice was provided for more than 362 patients
- Patients supported for longer than 6 weeks: 74
- Needs supported alongside housing include alcohol, dual diagnosis, multiple/complex needs, mental health, offenders at risk of reoffending, older people with mental health/dementia, physical/sensory disability, drug misuse, learning disabilities, financial welfare

Cultural & Creative Events Fund

Colchester City Council in partnership with the North East Essex Health and Wellbeing Alliance together made available a Fund with a total value of £30,000 to consider applications for micro grants of between £250 and £1,500 maximum for cultural and creative events/activity taking place between 1st May 2024 and 30th April 2025. 26 projects have been funded. Colchester Playground Equipment

We have used funding to make improvements to several play areas across Colchester to improve accessibility and play value, focusing on play sites in the most deprived LSOAs. This will improve opportunities for physical activity for children and families who need it the most in the long term.

SUICIDE PREVENTION

⁻owards the end of 2022 we contacted the 12th Man campaign - a Mental Health Awareness campaign focussing on men's mental health, which operated mainly in Suffolk and Norfolk. They had worked in Colchester before with some funding from Colchester Catalyst, but this had come to an end. They were keen to expand into North East Essex so our team signposted them to the Be Well funding pot and advised them during bid writing. The 12th Man was successful in securing £50 000 to expand their work into Colchester and Tendring. Since then, we have linked them in with colleagues from Community360, Tendring District Council, Active Essex, Colchester Leisure World, Essex County Council (Public Health), Essex Pedal Power, and CCC Comms team. In August 2023 the 12th Man was delivering MHFA training to Colchester Sports Park staff members.

RESEARCH

Our Officers regularly provided information, contacts, and introductions to the researchers from Community360, CVST, and Healthwatch Essex who were writing the Community Asset Maps for the 6 Live Well Domains. The Officers also read and provided feedback for the draft reports ahead of publishing. The research team sent the Officers their appreciation for every report they provided support for.

Physical Activity

Essex Pedal Power Colchester proudly celebrates its first anniversary, marking a year of transformative impact on the local community.

Launched with the goal of promoting healthier lifestyles, fostering community connections, and improving overall well-being, the project has exceeded all expectations in its inaugural year. Since its inception, **Essex Pedal Power Colchester has distributed 495 bikes to individuals** in the Greenstead area, providing them with a sustainable and enjoyable means of transportation. In addition to bike distribution, the project has placed a strong emphasis on safety and skill development.

The funding for the ParkPlays in Colchester has been provided by Colchester City Council and Active Essex. This initiative is part of the Sport England Local Delivery Pilot (LDP), an ongoing programme from 2018 to 2025 that aims to test new health and wellbeing projects. The LDP complements the efforts of the NHS in encouraging healthy and active lifestyles, with the expectation of reducing the prevalence of long-term conditions, such as cardiovascular disease and Type-2 diabetes, and improving mental health.

Did you know?

Colchester is both Britain's newest city and its oldest recorded town. It became a city in 2022, as part of the late Queen's Jubilee Civic Honours, but has a long and rich history dating back more than 2,000 years. This history includes being the first major city of Roman Britain, which was attacked and destroyed by Boudica, Queen of the ancient British Iceni tribe, in a famous uprising in AD61. The modern city still has remnants of its Roman past as well as (relatively) more recent history such as Colchester Castle, which was built in the 11th century and is the largest of its kind in Europe.

Public Health Grant Process

City of Sanctuary

The council initially became a non-awarded member of the City of Sanctuary network by signing up to their vision and values in 2016 but is now working towards joining the network as an awarded member.

- Attend regional asylum and refugee reference group hosted by the Strategic Migration Partnership
- Attend East of England Resettlement meetings
- Attend LGA forum for tackling anti asylum activity meeting
- Member of Essex Refugee Task Force
- The council's website has been updated to provide information to residents about the different resettlement schemes but also to provide vital information for those arriving in Colchester whether it be as a refugee or asylum seeker.
- Welcome Pack have been produced for Asylum seekers moving to Colchester. The pack has been produced in English, Arabic, Dari, Urdu and Turkish.
- A master's student from the University was commissioned to produce a needs analysis of migrants and refugees in Colchester.
- A member of the team presented to 100 other councils on work carried out by the team to prevent homelessness in newly granted refugees.
- The team are hosting the director of the Boys and Men's club and an African Families in the UK ambassador one and a half days a week, who provides valuable lived experience and insight.
- Supported the Migrant Democracy event held at RAMA
- Two members of the teams have studied OISC level one training in immigration advice
- Events planned for Refugee Week 2025

It offers a warm space, hot drinks, employment and volunteering support, informal ESOL, a hot meal, SIM cards and a chance to practice English is a warm and safe space.

The hub is open to all from Colchester but is also attended by men from Wethersfield

Employment Support

From June, we started to offer one-to-one support for refugees and people seeking asylum the support and guidance needed for getting ready for employment.

Working alongside RAMA and Essex Integration, we have been able to offer the following bespoke services:

- CV writing, and updating
- Help with online job searching
- · Help with applications for voluntary and paid employment
- Transferring qualifications to English equivalents
- Informal English classes
- Practice for driving theory tests

Job Club

As part of the employment support, we have started holding a monthly Job Club at RAMA's new premises. Each month, the room is full of those eager to get ready for work here in the UK.

Over coffee and biscuits, everyone supports each other with ideas, tips, and shared interview experiences (good and bad!).

We have key staff members also in the room to help from Essex Integration, RAMA, Together We Grow, STEP, and CCC.

Topics covered so far:

- Transferrable skills
- Positive and negative words for CVs
- Keeping Safe whilst job hunting Online Safety and Modern Slavery awareness
- Understanding work documents
- Voluntary work
- Health & Safety in the Workplace
- Prepping for job interviews

Asylum Seeker Digital Champion Training

From September, we started a ten-week training course, where our DAST team would help people seeking asylum and refugees to become Digital Champions. Each rolling ten-week course is for 7-10 individuals.

Throughout the ten-week course, the delegates learned to navigate around their device as well as the internet, settings, security and accessibility.

We also focused on using search engines for job hunting, registering for Indeed and other such job sites, setting up new email accounts, using Teams, Zoom, Skype and other online business platforms. We looked at common software including Excel Spreadsheets, Microsoft Word and Power Point.

Each delegate was presented with a certificate at the end of the course, so they could include this on their CVs, but more importantly, have the knowledge and confidence to help others in their communities.

Marks Tey Bridging Hotel

- Of the 31 families originally at the hotel 7 families presented as homeless when the hotel closed, all have been helped into long term housing.
- 9 families remain in Colchester and continue to be supported both by Essex Integration and CCC

• The 10 families in MOD accommodation, whose leases expired in July 2024 have all been supported into either LHAF housing or the private rented sector.

Family Reunion

• 1 family has been assisted in locating extended family who had fled to Islamabad and relocating them to Colchester. This involved a large amount of joint working with the Home Office


EQUALITY, DIVERSITY, AND INCLUSION.

This is now an established and much-loved annual event, co-ordinated by members of Wimpole Road Methodist Church with the support of St Stephen's Church and the wider New Town Community. This is not intended to be a fund raiser nor a profit-making venture, but simply to provide an inclusive and family friendly event for the residents. Everybody is hugely grateful for the monies given from the Loyalty Budget which enables us to put on this community focused day, which brought hundreds of people together for a wonderful afternoon of fun and enable us to support local charities. KINGSLAND CHURCH – PRETTYGATE

The award will be spent on providing a warm, safe, and comfortable environment for the baby clothes swap and the activities for the elderly to take place. The award will contribute to the power, light, and heat for the building. Both projects are managed in the main by volunteers, and the award will be used for the volunteer expenses. As well as the film club, there is a free art club for elderly people in the community, and here is a quote from one of the participants. This group has been a lifeline. It's an opportunity to be creative, and we all work together but on our own projects, so we move at our own speed and pace. The friendships that have developed are genuine, so I don't feel so lonely. There's always other things happening in the cafe, so I feel in touch and included." Here is a quote from one of the mothers using the baby clothes swap. "I got involved even before my baby was born, as I knew I would need some clothes. I found the group on Facebook, and I travel here from near Asda. It's more than just coming to get clothes, there's a sense of community here. Mothers helping other mothers. The clothes help families who are struggling financially because everything helps. It makes me feel good to bring the clothes back when I don't need them anymore, so another mother can use them. I also feel good because we're recycling and helping the environment." Vivienne – volunteer.

Section 106 - Community

The Community & Partnerships Team submit S106 community facility contribution requests wherever a new development of houses has been approved. All submissions need to meet the section 106 threshold.

We will continue to work closely with local community groups, community facilities, parish & town councils and ward councillors, to confirm new community projects (capital, fixture, and fittings) that would mitigate the increase in the population, from the development.

Some examples of the upgrades made through being in receipt of some S106 funding:

Christ Church Parish Church (New Town and Christ Church ward) received £36,865.13 from S106 funding, to help support their community project to upgrade their building, earlier last year. SECTION 106 LANGHAM COMMUNITY SHOP

The Langham Community shop celebrates its 20th year in 2024 and has grown to be an important part of the local infrastructure. Along with the provision of essential goods, it is also a Local Authority recycling distribution point and provides monthly free soup lunch events. The Community shop wanted to expand its offer and through a section 106 award was able to introduce an adjacent cabin space. Providing a new space for a coffee and is even used as a flexible workspace for local people.





Digital Access Project

The Digital Access Support Team, represent and undertake activities on behalf of the Digital Access Project, a collaboration between Northeast Essex Integrated Care Board, Tendring District Council and Colchester City Council, who manage the project on behalf of the partnership.

By using partnerships, resources, and structures already established, the team provide support and opportunity to the most vulnerable, neurodivergent, diverse, disadvantaged, residents, at the first basic level, then provide experience where possible or sign post up the chain to other organisations where required to improve access to employment and educational opportunities leading to an improved quality of life.

The teamwork alongside partners such as Community Volunteer Services Tendring, Digital Inclusion Team at Essex County Council, Changing Lives, Armed Forces Business Centre, Hawks Farm Resort, DWP, a variety of health services, and many community groups, they are also an online centre with Good Things Foundation.



Continuously flexing their service to need, with future services including a digital champion package, that also provides for some, voluntary community work experience with the DAST team, and where relevant with partners, thus developing experience but mainly self-confidence.



As well as a Top Tips to Finding a Job Online tutorial, which enables those individuals out of work with some key skills on how to go 'job hunting' online.

The team are also promoting how individuals can use apps and browser to self-care, including NHS App drop ins and tutorials within our GP surgeries. As well as others on, understanding the NHS website and navigating around your GP website, as there are many services that individuals may not be aware of.

Fixed Digital Access Points (FDAPs) are devices in a secure and lockable stand, which are situated in several locations. The screen is locked onto a kiosk of 16 tiles, 6 of which are on all devices. These are: • Venue • Council • NHS • DAST • ECC • Seasonal (this changes dependent on requirement at time), Full list of FDAPs can be found via our <u>website</u>.

The team are currently, alongside others within the organisation learning British Sign Language as an additional team skill to use in the community.











Digital Access Support Team Impact

They provide this first stage of knowledge and confidence via adhoc one to ones, group sessions, <u>digital chat support sessions</u>, tutorials and workshops.



Text and background colour combinations were also changed to dark grey on white, as this helps those with visual conditions such as cataracts, glaucoma, and retinitis pigmentosa.



Creative students and artist illustrated Colchester's Heritage in Mural

A group of creative students from the Gilberd school have collaborated with a local artist to brighten Highwoods Community Centre.

Funded by Essex County Council Locality Fund, the Gilberd School Legacy Project has culminated in a stunning mural at the Highwoods Community Centre, celebrating the City's rich history and development in a vibrant pop-art style.

The project aimed at fostering creativity and community engagement among students through collaborative projects that enhance public spaces and celebrate local heritage.

The school held a mural design competition in October 2023, receiving over 65 entries. From these, 15 winners were selected. Students involved in the project then met up with the artist to discuss the final design of the mural.

The artwork from the students captures the essence of Colchester's landmarks and heritage. Notable sites such as Colchester Castle, St. Botolph's Priory, St John's Abbey Gate, Sage House, the Town Hall, Jumbo Tower, and Firstsite are prominently featured, showcasing the city's evolution through a creative lens.

The mural by a local artist took months to complete and serves as a testament to the students' artistic vision and dedication.

On Monday, 8 July, the winning students, representatives from St John's & Highwoods Community Centre, and artist Adrian Leroy gathered with local councillors, including Councillor Alison Jay, Councillor Simon Appleton (Highwoods ward Cllr's), and Councillor Natalie Sommers, to unveil the mural and share their insights about the project.

Councillor David King, Leader of Colchester Council said: 'The artwork brightens up and brings energy to the community. This collaborative effort between the students and Adrian has brought colour and life to the area. We hope to have more collaborative mural projects in the future, where members of the community can foster a sense of city pride and beautify public spaces.

"We will be posting photos of the murals online, but I really hope people will come and see the artwork in person."



Colchester awarded Compassionate City status

Colchester now has national recognition as the first Compassionate City in the East of England, which community champions believe will inspire more people to be kind and compassionate to others in need of support during life's most difficult moments.

Local groups, workplaces, organisations, businesses, clubs, and community hubs are all part of a Compassionate Colchester network that has been working collaboratively towards Compassionate City status. An assessment from the national charity Compassionate Communities UK confirmed the kindness and compassion being shown to people confronted with serious or life-limiting illness, ageing, caregiving, loss, and isolation.

Many residents are part of the Compassionate Community network, including Janice Longe. She said: "Someone's final months or year of life, and that of their carers, can be made much easier with the kindness and compassion of people they meet on a day-to-day basis. We can all play a part, however small, sometimes without realising it, by just saying hello and starting a conversation or by dropping off a pint of milk when someone can't leave the house."

Acknowledging yet more can be done, Compassionate Colchester is also launching a Compassionate Champions initiative to recognise and celebrate people, projects, groups, or places that help improve the lives of others facing serious or life-limiting illness, ageing, caregiving, and loss through social connectedness, kindness, and compassion.

Cllr David King, Leader of the Council, said: "It's great to see national recognition for the tireless work providing end-of-life and serious illness support. Let's all build on this momentum by expanding the network of care and kindness. Answer the call from the Compassionate Colchester network and nominate your Compassionate Community Champions. These can be the people, places, and projects that have made a positive difference for you and your loved ones. Perhaps it's a resident looking out for neighbours, a community group offering friendship and support, or a business that compassionately cares for its staff and customers. Community Supermarket Launches in the Heart of Greenstead, offering affordable food and household essentials to local residents

A new Community Supermarket is coming to Greenstead on 1 March 2024, providing local residents with the chance to buy food and household essentials at discounted prices.

For a small membership fee, residents with a Colchester postcode will be able to come and shop once a week at the Greenstead Community Supermarket. It is open Thursday to Saturday from 9:30am until 12:30 noon.

The community supermarket offers people who may be struggling with food bills the opportunity to purchase food and household essentials at reduced prices, bridging the gap between food banks and affordable supermarkets.

The supermarket is being delivered in partnership with Colchester City Council, Essex County Council and the Divine Assembly Ministries; and has been made possible through funding from Colchester City Council via the UK Shared Prosperity Fund and Colchester Borough Homes Community Fund.

The shop will be run by the Divine Assembly Ministries, a Colchester-based church led by Nigerian pastors who provide valuable support across the Community, including the BOAZ Outreach Project. It is the seventh community supermarket supported by Essex County Council's levelling up funding.
