# Colchester Borough Council Publication of the Site Allocations Submission Document Soundness Self-Assessment

#### September 2009

The soundness self-assessment for the Site Allocations Submission Document contains a number of components as recommended by the Planning Advisory Service.

To date the self-assessment includes up to and including Stage 4: Publication. The self-assessment will be further updated after representations made at the publication stage have been received and collated by the Council. Once representations have been received the Council will update the self-assessment with Stage 5: Submission prior to the Site Allocations document being sent to the Secretary of State who will appoint a Planning Inspector to conduct the Examination in Public.
